Issue:

Jefferson County Open Space (JCOS) staff requests Board of County Commissioners (BCC) approval to accept an \$80,000 USDA Forest Service grant for Forest Health Youth Corps funding and a \$20,000 budget supplement to accommodate the grant.

Background:

In February 2023, County departments were notified of the opportunity to apply for Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) funds. JCOS applied for \$80,000 through Senators Hickenlooper and Bennet, and Representative Petterson to support a Forest Health Youth Corps project. Due to tight deadlines, the application was not presented to the BCC at that time. On September 27, 2024, JCOS received a Federal Financial Assistance Award letter for \$80,000 for the project.

Discussion:

This project provides youth summer employment opportunities that contribute to responsible forest management and mentor's future stewards of our natural environment. Youth Corp crews will perform wildfire mitigation and forest pest mitigation in Jefferson County open spaces that are at high risk of catastrophic wildfire. Work includes reducing ladder fuels and opening tree canopies to slow the spread of fire.

Issue:

Jefferson County Open Space (JCOS) staff requests approval from the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) for the Chair to execute Amendments One and Two to the Contract Between Larimer County and Jefferson County Open Space.

Background:

The RESTORE Colorado Program (Restoration and Stewardship of Outdoor Resources and the Environment) employs a collaborative funding model to support large-scale habitat restoration and stewardship projects across public and private lands. The program is administered by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF).

Larimer County was the applicant for the RESTORE grant awarded in 2022 and JCOS was a subrecipient.

Discussion:

The original Agreement dated August 30, 2022 (attached as Exhibit A to Amendment One to the Contract) for \$26,250 identified Jefferson County as one of the recipients of a grant from NFWF to restore winter habitat needed for elk and mule deer. Larimer County and Jefferson County are requesting an amendment to the original contract to increase the grant to Jefferson County by \$20,625 for a total award of \$46,875.

In the original Agreement, it was agreed that Larimer County's portion of the NFWF grant was not to exceed \$161,625. The original Agreement between Jefferson County and Larimer County requires the mutual consent of Colorado Parks and Wildlife, City of Fort Collins, Boulder County, Jefferson County, and Larimer County in order to increase Larimer County's overall contribution under the Agreement between Larimer County and Jefferson County. The purpose of this Amendment is to increase the total Agreement dollar amount to be contributed by Larimer County to \$171,675.00.

The additional funds coming to JCOS and Larimer County (\$20,625 to JCOS and \$10,050 to Larimer County) are coming from funds Boulder County is unable to use. There are no additional match requirements.

Issue:

Requesting approval to grant a permanent utility easement to Public Service Company of Colorado (PSCo) for a new service line that supplies power to electric vehicle (EV) charging stations at Lookout Mountain Preserve.

Background:

Jefferson County's Climate Action Plan 2022 has adopted strategic climate programs and goals, including: 1) BCC Resolution CC20-254, declaring Climate Change a critical priority for Jefferson County, 2) Jefferson County's Climate Action Plan, and 3) Jefferson County's Electric Vehicle Action Plan.

To help meet these goals, Jefferson County Open Space (JCOS) installed EV charging stations at Crown Hill and Clear Creek Canyon Parks and these charging stations are effectively reducing local greenhouse gas emissions (10.2 Tons in their first year) and simultaneously generating revenue. JCOS wants to install additional EV charging stations at Lookout Mountain Preserve.

Discussion:

The proposed EV charging stations at Lookout Mountain Preserve are estimated to cost approximately \$65,000 and JCOS is seeking grant funds to offset the cost. PSCo is offering JCOS a \$19,000 construction allowance through its EV Service Infrastructure Program to cover the installation of new electric service to power the EV charging stations. In exchange for these funds, JCOS must grant a permanent utility easement to PSCo for the service line and agree to install two EV charging stations that provide ports to charge four vehicles at a time. JCOS will also apply for a \$25,000 Charge Ahead Colorado Grant and will cover the remaining \$21,000 with Open Space funds. The EV charging stations will be located in the northwest corner of the parking area at Lookout Mountain Preserve, just north of Boettcher Mansion.



Issue:

Jefferson County Open Space (JCOS) proposes to convey the 1.581-acre Kittredge Park to the Evergreen Park & Recreation District (EPRD).

Background:

JCOS acquired Kittredge Park in 1986 and since then has leased it to EPRD. For decades, park visitors have recreated down to and within Bear Creek on the south side of the park. JCOS recently settled a legal dispute regarding access to portions of the land located south of the park and completed a land exchange to clearly delineate boundaries between park property lying north of Bear Creek and private property lying south of Bear Creek.

Discussion:

Rather than amending the lease agreement to include these newly acquired portions of the park, and exclude the conveyed portions, the parties have agreed to terminate the lease agreement and JCOS will deed the entirety of Kittredge Park to EPRD, enabling the expansion of the park's trail system, and providing increased access to Bear Creek. The Jeffco Open Space Reverter will be placed on the Property to ensure it is used exclusively for park and open space purposes.



Issue:

In 2021, the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) approved the Community Partnership Program (CPP) and allocated 7% of the County's annual Colorado Lottery proceeds, held in the County's Conservation Trust Fund (CTF), for this purpose. Evergreen Park & Recreation District (EPRD) has submitted a proposal for improvements for Kittredge Park which has been reviewed by Jeffco Open Space (JCOS) and will be presented to the BCC for consideration and action.

Background:

Adopted August 31, 2021, the Administrative Policy Conservation Trust Fund allocates 7% annual Colorado Lottery proceeds for the CPP. The CPP provides funding to 501(c)(3) nonprofit or governmental entities for up to 25% of local or up to 50% of regional conservation, park, and recreation projects in unincorporated Jefferson County. As of September 1, 2024, the CPP had a balance of \$776,287.89 for these purposes.

Through awards approved by the BCC, funding can be used for the acquisition, development, and maintenance of new conservation properties, for capital improvements, or for the maintenance of recreational amenities on publicly owned sites. CPP proposals are accepted at any time, evaluated by JCOS, and approved by the BCC.

Discussion:

EPRD has submitted a proposal requesting \$50,000 for the improvements to Kittredge Park to support a new bathroom, parking improvements and preservation of a nature trail. The application for Kittredge Park improvements is a local project with an estimated total cost of \$162,700. EPRD will meet the 50% required matching contributions which are estimated at \$112,700 or 69%.



Issue:

Future award of a purchase order for construction of two failing water diversion structures at Hildebrand Ranch Park.

Background:

The County owns and operates ditch rights along Deer Creek in Hildebrand Ranch Park. The ditches utilize four diversion structures to draw water rights from Deer Creek. One structure was replaced in 2015, however the other three are still in need of replacement. The County hired a consultant to design replacement of the three remaining structures. These designs have been completed and permitted.

Discussion:

The County has issued a Request for Cost Proposals (RFCP) to the four companies on the Master Contract for General Construction Services. The RFCP is for construction services to replace two (Garden and Hayland) of the three designed structures in 2024-2025 with an anticipated cost of approximately \$800,000.



Issue:

Future award of a purchase order for design of improvements at North Table Mountain Park (NTM).

Background:

Currently, the West trailhead at NTM has capacity for approximately 70 vehicles and during high visitation there is often overflow parking onto the entry road. It is proposed to expand the trailhead to approximately 130 vehicles. Tucker Gulch trail connects north Golden to the HWY 6 trail and downtown Golden, however, there is a missing link through NTM. This project would design the missing link and provide connectivity for recreation and commuting. With potential development in the area, there is the opportunity to realign the access road to NTM. The realignment would increase access by allowing full turning movements to and from NTM onto HWY 93.

During the summer of 2023 several storms damaged the service roads at NTM. The County has applied for FEMA mitigation funding under disaster declaration DR-4731 to mitigate the damage. Before repairs can start, a hydrology and hydraulics (H&H) study should be completed to determine appropriate mitigation measures.

Discussion:

The County has developed a Scope of Work (SOW) for design services utilizing an existing master contract of Tucker Gulch Trail, expanding the West Trailhead, and realigning the entry road. Incorporating the H&H study into the overall project will prevent duplicate work and provide a cost-effective way to inform needed mitigation efforts. Approximately \$2,000,000 is in the combined adopted and proposed budgets of 2024-2025 for design and construction services.






North Table Mountain Park
