Grant/Program	Funding	Description and Funding Issue
MMOF (Multimodal Transportation and Mitigation Options Fund)	\$0	Funding was voluntarily declined due to a change in project scope and a State request to relinquish funds amid budget constraints tied to federal actions. As MMOF funds are no longer needed, there is no fiscal impact.
SS4A (Safe Streets for All)	\$545,000	Adopt and implement a Vision Zero Action Plan. FHWA has requested the County update grants policy to state it reimburses vendors promptly. This policy has been updated.
USDOT - new guidance on federally funded programs	monitoring	Guidance from federal agency- not a project. Notice of reprioritization of grants, loans, contracts and state contracts. Termination of User Pay. Ending of vaccine and mask mandates. Compliance with federal immigration enforcement and DEI programs.
Building Resilient Infrastructure for Communities (BRIC)	\$5,953,821	Funding to stabilize the reinforced soil slope (RSS) located at the airport. The program was terminated. Airport funds from other projects will be utilized to carry out slope stabilization.

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TANF (Temporary Assistance to Needy Families)	\$8,450,000	<p>Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) helps low-income families with children achieve economic stability through temporary cash assistance, job training, and supportive services. Jefferson County's TANF allocation is approximately \$9,000,000 with 85% federal funds (\$7,650,000).</p> <p>TANF State Long-Term Reserve funds supports Child Welfare in providing educational transportation to ensure children in out-of-home placements can remain in their school of origin (\$200,000). The TANF Long-Term Reserve also provides financial support for children in a non-certified kinship placement (\$600,000).</p> <p>On January 6, the Governor received notice from the federal government of a temporary restricted drawdown, or freeze, on certain federal funds to Colorado. On January 9, a Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) was issued for a period of 14 days in response to this notification.</p>
SSBG – Child Welfare and Adult Protection	\$1,800,000	<p>Jefferson County receives approximately \$1.6 million annually (\$133,500 monthly) in Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) funding through the Child Welfare Block Grant. The SSBG makes up about 5% of this allocation. The County does not charge expenses directly to SSBG; instead, eligible costs are allocated through cost pools using Random Moment Sampling (RMS).</p> <p>Jefferson County also receives approximately \$200,000 annually (\$16,500 monthly) in SSBG funding for Adult Protective Services (APS). The SSBG makes up approximately 10% of this allocation. As with Child Welfare, expenses are allocated through cost pools using RMS rather than charged directly to SSBG.</p> <p>On January 6, the Governor received notice from the federal government of a temporary restricted drawdown, or freeze, on certain federal funds to Colorado. On January 9, a Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) was issued for a period of 14 days in response to this notification.</p>
CCCAP (Colorado Child Care Assistance Program)	\$9,000,000	<p>The Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) is the primary federal funding source supporting access to affordable childcare for low-income families and improving childcare quality. In Colorado, these funds are administered through the Colorado Child Care Assistance Program (CCCAP), which assists families who are homeless, working, seeking employment, or enrolled in school. The CCCAP allocation is approximately \$12,000,000 with 75% federal funds (\$9,000,000).</p> <p>On January 6, the Governor received notice from the federal government of a temporary restricted drawdown affecting</p>

		certain federal funds, including CCDF. On January 9, a Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) was issued for a period of 14 days in response to this notification.
SNAP redeterminations-Pilot Program	Monitoring	Letter from US Department of Agriculture (USDA) outlining new requirements for specific counties: Required Actions for the Colorado Department of Human Services (CDHS): Recertify all SNAP households in Arapahoe, Adams, Jefferson, Boulder, and Douglas counties within 30 days of receipt of the letter. Verify full SNAP eligibility, including income and resources of excluded household members. Conduct in-person interviews as part of the recertification process. Use federal eligibility verification tools, including the SAVE Program database. Determine eligibility for each household and disenroll any ineligible households. Document and retain all records supporting current recertifications and prior certifications. Failure to comply with the pilot requirements may trigger federal noncompliance procedures under 7 U.S.C. § 2020(g) and could impact Colorado's continued participation in SNAP.

Colorado Sexual Health Initiative (CoSHI)-Child Welfare	\$15,000	Human Services received notice from the State that funding for the Colorado Sexual Health Initiative (CoSHI) was discontinued due to federal actions mandating the end of the program.
SNAP (Supplemental Assistance Nutrition Program)-Section 10102 – Modifications to Work Requirements for certain populations	Monitoring	H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025. SNAP (Supplemental Assistance Nutrition Program): Match Requirement Changes	\$11,401,932	H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025.  SNAP changes shift a greater share of costs from the federal government to the state. State could require local matches to increase to 25% match for administrative costs effective October 2026. New match for benefits effective October 2027, up to 15% (based on FY2025 State Payment Error

		Rate, 10%).
Medicaid: Establish Medicaid Work Requirements Affordable Care Act (ACA) Medicaid Expansion Population	Monitoring	<p>H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025.</p> <p>Beginning Dec. 31, 2026, states would be required to implement work requirements for the expansion population. Members ages 19-64, who do not meet certain exceptions, would be required to attest to conducting 80 hours per month of community engagement (work, community service or work program, etc.)</p> <p>Assuming similar administrative costs as Arkansas of \$152/enrollee, Colorado’s administrative costs could total more than \$57 million. Given Colorado’s state supervised, county administered model, implementation of this new requirement would have additional administrative costs to consider.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ (From HCPF, <i>CO Medicaid Insights &amp; Potential Federal Medicaid Reduction Impact Estimates</i>)</li> </ul>
Medicaid: Every 6-month eligibility redeterminations for certain populations	Monitoring	<p>H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025.</p> <p>Beginning Dec. 31, 2026, individuals eligible under the ACA expansion must have their Medicaid eligibility redetermined every 6 months versus the traditional 12 months. Increasing the frequency of eligibility redeterminations from annually to biannually would result in the potential for more members to lose coverage due to administrative reasons if the renewals cannot be done through automation, thereby requiring member action. Counties would also incur far higher costs to complete more redeterminations. Effective January 2028</p> <p>(From HCPF, <i>CO Medicaid Insights &amp; Potential Federal Medicaid Reduction Impact Estimates</i>)</p>
Medicaid: Revises home equity limit for long-term care eligibility	Monitoring	<p>H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025.</p> <p>Establish a \$1M ceiling for home equity values when determining allowable assets for Medicaid beneficiaries that are eligible for long-term care. Also eliminates the use of asset disregards from being applied to waive home equity limits. Effective January 2028.</p>
Medicaid: No Federal Funds without verified citizenship	Monitoring	<p>H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025.</p> <p>This provision would result in shifting the financing for costs incurred during the reasonable opportunity period from Medicaid funding (with a state and federal share) to state-only funds if the state continues to provide medical assistance during that time period. Effective October 2026.</p> <p>(From HCPF, <i>CO Medicaid Insights &amp; Potential Federal Medicaid Reduction Impact Estimates</i>)</p> <p>Would also prohibit the County from giving individuals time to present documentation if verification cannot be found through the County’s interface.</p>

Medicaid: Modifications to retroactive coverage from three months to one month	Monitoring	H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025.  Shortening the retroactive coverage period may reduce overall Medicaid costs by limiting the timeframe for which Jefferson County residents can receive backdated coverage. Some residents could be left without coverage for care received before enrollment. Effective January 1, 2027
Medicaid: Modifying cost sharing requirements for certain expansion individuals under the Medicaid program.	Monitoring	H.R.1 was signed into law on July 4, 2025.  Effective October 1, 2028, would add mandatory deductions, cost-sharing or similar requirements for certain Medicaid Expansion enrollees (with incomes over 100% of the federal poverty line). Cost-sharing must be “greater than \$0,” but cannot exceed \$35, for any particular health care item or service rendered and may not be more than 5% of an individual’s income.
Case Management Agencies (CMA)	Monitoring	Notice from HCPF to resign contract that excludes EDIA language to align with federal requirements.
DRCOG Green workforce (grant)	\$0	Not awarded-this item will be removed from future briefings
USDOL - Pathways Home grant (US Department of Labor)	\$0	Not awarded- this item will be removed from future briefings
Workforce (fed employees support)	Monitoring	The Rapid Response program may provide support to individuals affected by federal layoffs. Monitoring the need/ability to support individuals affected by federal actions.
Workforce (funding)	Monitoring	Provides employment support to community members. monitoring potential impact to federal funding to Workforce-no confirmed loss of funding
Housing	Monitoring	Services for the homeless, housing, economic development and infrastructure improvement initiatives. Monitoring federal funding of programs such as emergency rental assistance-no confirmed loss.
Behavioral Health	monitoring	Mobile Crisis unit (JCMH) provides mental health support and services to community members. monitoring federal funding of programs-no confirmed loss.

Spending Budget Reduction (State Executive Order D 2025 014	\$200,000	The State is making budget cuts that will reduce funding for local public health. Jefferson County Public Health relies on these “pass-through” dollars to support community outreach and health planning, and we could lose about \$200,000 as a result.
Overdose Data to Action (OD2A)-Points West	\$10,000	The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) notified the County that approximately \$10K in anticipated Overdose Data to Action (OD2A) funds have been reduced.
Covid-funded Vaccine Programs	\$1,000,000	Vaccine Programs funded with COVID funds. Stop work order from CDPHE has been rescinded due to temporary restraining order (TRO) issued 4.05.2025. Monitoring situation.

Emergency Management Performance Grant (FMPG)	\$7,000	Federal funding for FY25 was reduced. Funding amount shown (\$7k) reflects amount of loss for FY25. FY26 will be \$80K, if funding is eliminated.
In-House Co-Responder Program (grant name unspecified)	\$550,000	JCSO was hoping to expand and create a more robust Co-Responder Program. The application for this grant was pulled due to certain Federal requirements associated with receiving funding
Wellness APP for JCSO employees- 3 grants (names unspecified)	\$180,000	Funding from these 3 grants would have purchased a Wellness app for JCSO employees. The applications for these grants were pulled due to certain Federal requirements associated with receiving funding

Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS)	\$781,512	Funding will be used to purchase biometric wristbands to electronically monitor inmates to improve healthcare and enable timely medical intervention. Applied, awaiting notice on the availability of funding.
Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS)	\$366,000	Funding will be used for upgrading and purchasing of equipment to provide a state-of-the-art forward Command Post, purchasing a communications unit that functions in our remote areas and the purchase of a personnel support trailer for extensive deployments. Applied, awaiting notice on the availability of funding.
Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS)	\$474,040	Funding will be used for purchasing new radios that offer greater capacity and capabilities for all large-scale incident responses. These upgrades would help support Jefferson County's Incident Management Team (IMT) as a region wide asset and these assets will create better support for future wildland fire response or any other large-scale incidents. Applied, awaiting notice on the availability of funding.
